Official Information Act Request

Our Ref: OIA353/1

- 1. I refer to your email of 31 March 2022 in which you request under the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA):
 - the details of the funding provided to the individual Crown Solicitors (and their firms) for the period from 2018 until the present financial year; and
 - details of how the funding to be allocated is calculated.
- 2. The following table sets out the amount of funding for each Crown Solicitor for work done in their capacity as Crown Solicitors for the 2018/19, 2019/20, 2020/21 and 2021/22 financial years. The 2021/22 amounts cover the period of July 2021 to March 2022 year to date (YTD).

- 3. Crown Solicitors are remunerated based on a bulk-funding model. Each year a set pool of funds is distributed by Crown Law proportionately between the Crown Solicitors based on the volume of cases each has undertaken and the "case mix", or types of matters the work related to. The quantum of the bulk fund is set by an appropriation, and does not get adjusted on an annual basis based on case volumes. Crown Solicitors are therefore not funded for Crown prosecution work on a per case basis, or on the basis of hours worked.
- 4. Under the model, in exchange for the warrant's share of the bulk fund, Crown Solicitors are required to deliver *all* Crown prosecution services within the geographical region of their warrant over the course of the year. This includes most High Court appeals, and other work associated with Crown prosecutions.¹ Crown Solicitor firms are also required to provide all supporting infrastructure including necessary technology, premises, and employing both support staff and Crown Prosecutors at appropriate levels of classification, to deliver the full range of Crown Solicitor work to a high standard.

- 5. Crown Solicitors may also be instructed by other government agencies to conduct non-Crown prosecutions, on a fee-paying basis in accordance with the Crown Solicitors: Terms of Office. This however only represents a small proportion of Crown Solicitor work. Crown Law does not hold information about the amounts paid to Crown Solicitors by other government agencies. When a government department seeks to brief out a prosecution, they must use the local Crown Solicitor, whereas Crown entities are encouraged to use the local Crown Solicitor. The hourly rates which Crown Solicitors can charge a government department for this work are set out in Appendix Two of the Terms of Office. There are presumptive caps on the number of hours that can be charged for certain steps in a prosecution.
- 6. You have the right, by way of complaint to the Ombudsman under section 28(3) of the OIA, to seek an investigation and review of our decision on your request for information.
